Maryland 4-H Dairy Judging Team

For the first time since 2018, Maryland had two dairy judging teams compete at national contests. The highlight of our year was placing 4th overall at World Dairy Expo! We placed 1st in the Brown Swiss breed and 4th in Holsteins, Jerseys and reasons. Individually, Emily placed 5th overall, 5th in overall reasons, 2nd in Brown Swiss and won the Lee Majeskie Memorial award for high reasons score in Brown Swiss with a perfect 50! Additionally,



Stephen placed 2nd in Jerseys and Brennan was 13th high individual. As well, we had success at the All-American in Harrisburg, finishing 6th overall and winning Ayrshires contest.

Our successes resulted in an invitation to The Royal Highland Show in Edinburgh, with additional visits to farms in Scotland, Northern Ireland and famous landmarks in London! We are humbled by this honor and have many people to thank: our families, 4-H leaders, coaches (Ryan Haines and Brian Schnebly), and all the dairy producers that helped us grow through participating in dairy judging activities.

Our dairy judging experiences have helped us develop life skills in public speaking, leadership, decision making and analysis and, most importantly, how to work as a team.

Our goal is to raise \$50,000 to cover the travel expenses of this fourteen-day trip. If we are fortunate enough to raise more than we need for the trip, additional funds will be placed in an account to help future dairy judging teams travel to national and international Contests.



4-H KEY TERMS

What does it mean to be a *member in good standing*?

A member in good standing is an active member of their club attending 75% of club meetings. This member also stays for the duration of the meeting and participates in club activities.

What defines a *completed project*?

A project is considered **complete** when a 4-Her gives a <u>demonstration</u> and enters an <u>exhibit</u> in the Fair that <u>correlates to the project</u>. A neat, complete and <u>correct</u> project record sheet would also need to be included in the 4-Her's record book. *For example,* if I signed up for the sheep project, I would need to exhibit my lamb, complete a demonstration highlighting my knowledge of sheep, and complete the large animal project record in order for my project to be considered complete.

What is a *demonstration*?

A demonstration is a talk or presentation about a subject you are familiar with or highlighting your knowledge or skills related to your project. Demonstrations do not have to relate to project work, however, to complete a *project* for a potential award, the demonstration would need to relate to the project work.

How are Project Pins awarded?

Project pins are awarded to the *highest scoring record book* in a particular project area. The 4-Her must enter a **completed project** and be an **active member in good standing** with their club(s).

The Maryland Sheep Breeders Association, in conjunction with the Maryland Sheep and Wool Festival, is offering a scholarship in the amount of \$1,000.00 to a student who has been accepted or is in the process of applying for continuing education at a college or university, technical school, or vocational school. All academic majors will be considered, but priority will be given to agricultural or agriculture related majors (such as food science, veterinarian, ag. teaching, etc.). Our 4-H Essay Topic this year is

The Importance of Youth in Beekeeping: How 4-H Members Can Make a Difference! For this essay, a 4-H student should answer these questions: Why youth is important in beekeeping? How can 4-H members make a difference? How can more young people involved in beekeeping? What are your future plans as a beekeeper? What is a major contribution a young beekeeper has brought to the Industry?

Eligibility: The 2025 National 4-H Beekeeping Essay Competition is open to active 4-H Club members only. Any 4-H Club member who placed first, second, or third in previous years of the national competition is NOT eligible to win in 2025; however, state competition winners remain eligible to enter the national competition. Essays entered must encompass the

designated topic only. There will be no exceptions.

Competition Rules & Essay Requirements: Any 4-H Club member interested in writing an essay should contact Amanda Wahle, 4-H Youth Development Specialist at <u>awahle@umd.edu</u> for competition details. Essays should be submitted directly to the state office (Amanda Wahle) by email no later than April 18th to be considered for National Judging. A state-level committee will review all entries and pick one to submit on behalf of the state.

Failure to meet any one of the essay requirements will result in disqualification.

Essay Requirements for National Judging: Essays must be typewritten or computer-generated on single-sided pages and formatted following standard manuscript format using double-spaced type and 12pt font in a legible font face. Essays must encompass the designated topic in 750 to 1,000 words. Word count does not include sources, works cited, or the writer's biographical statement. All factual statements and interview references must be cited in a "sources" or "bibliography."

Essays will be judged on (a) scope of research, 40%; (b)accuracy, 30%; (c) creativity, 10%; (d) conciseness,10%; and (e) logical development of the topic, 10%.

On a separate page, please include a brief biographical statement of the writer, including mailing address, email address, and phone number.

Awards: Three cash prizes will be awarded in the 2025 National 4-H Beekeeping Essay Competition. The author of the highest-scoring essay will win first prize. The author of the second-highest-scoring essay will win second prize. The author of the third-highest-scoring essay will win the third prize. First Prize: \$750 Second Prize: \$500 Third Prize: \$250 The three prize-winning essays will be published in ABF Quarterly, the magazine of the American Beekeeping Federation. All authors of essays submitted to the national competition will receive a relevant book on honey bees, beekeeping, or honey.



The Junior Sheep & Goat Skillathon will be held on Sunday, May 4 at the Howard County Fairgrounds. The contest is open to any youth between the ages of 8 and 18. Youth will compete according to their age on January 1, 2025 (4-H age). Individuals from any county, state, or province may compete. Pre-registration is required. Participants should bring clipboards and pencils to use during the contest. There is a \$5.00 registration fee to enter the skillathon. The fee will help to defray the cost of refreshments, awards, and supplies.

A skillathon tests the youth's broad knowledge of a topic. At the sheep and goat skillathon, all stations will obviously pertain to sheep and goats. Stations in the past have included breed ID, feed/forage ID, meat ID and judging, equipment ID, hay judging, fleece (wool) judging, sheep judging (wool or dual-purpose breed), and fiber ID. There have also been stations pertaining to animal health (general disease and parasites).

Homemade Breakfast Pizza

Preheat oven to 500 degrees. Place pizza pan in oven to preheat. Combine **1 cup of flour**, **1 envelope of rapid rise yeast**, **1 1/2 teaspoons of sugar**, **3/4 teaspoon of salt**, **2/3 cup of very warm water** and **3 tablespoons of olive oil** in a bowl. Mix until a soft dough forms. Knead for 4 minutes. Cover and let rest for 10 minutes.

While the dough is rising, cook **5 slices of bacon** until they are crisp. Drain and crumble.

Stretch the dough to a 10-12 inch circle. Place on parchment and bake for 6 minutes.

Remove from oven and top with **1 1/2 cups of grated mozzarella cheese** and the crumbled bacon. Crack **3 eggs** onto the top of the pizza (create wells in the cheese to contain the eggs). Brush the edge of the crust with olive oil and bake for an additional 6-8 minutes or until eggs are set. Garnish with chopped chives.









Italian Stuffed Peppers

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Lightly coat a baking dish with nonstick spray. Slice 4 large bell peppers from top to bottom, removing stems, seeds and membrane. Arrange in prepared dish cut side up. Heat 2 tablespoons of olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add 1 pound of ground chicken or turkey, 2 teaspoons of Italian seasoning, 1 teaspoon of thyme, 1 teaspoon of oregano, 1 teaspoon of garlic powder, and 1/4 teaspoon of red pepper flakes. Cook, breaking apart until browned and cooked through. Drain off any excess liquid. Next pour in 1 15 ounce can of diced tomatoes, Let simmer for 1 minute. Remove pan from heat and stir in 1 1/2 cups of cooked brown rice Mix 1/2 cup of mozzarella, 1/2 cup of provolone, and 1/2 a cup of parmesan cheese in a separate bowl. Stir 3/4 cup of the cheese mixture into the rice and meat mixture. Mound the mixture into the pepper halves and top with remaining cheese mixture. Pour 1 cup of tomato sauce in the pan and bake for 30-35 minutes or until the peppers are tender and the cheese is melted. Top with 2 tablespoons of chopped fresh basil. Serve hot!









BBQ Chicken Pineapple Pizza

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Combine 1 cup of flour, 1 packet of pizza crust yeast, 1 1/2 teaspoons of sugar, 2/3 cup of warm water and 3 tablespoons of oil. Mix until well blended. Add more flour until a soft dough is formed (3/4–1 cup more). Knead dough on floured surface until smooth. Pat dough into a greased pizza pan. Prebake crust for 6 minutes. Remove from oven. Spread a thin layer of BBQ sauce on crust. Top with a cup of mozzarella cheese and 1/4 of a large red onion sliced thin. Next add 1 1/2 cups of chopped cooked chicken to a bowl along with a few tablespoons of **BBQ sauce**. Stir to combine. Spread over pizza. Next add **diced pineapple** to the pizza and top with more mozzarella cheese. Bake for 10-15 minutes or until crust is golden brown and cheese is bubbly.









Pina Colada Waffles

Preheat your waffle iron. Combine **2 cups of flour**, **2 tablespoons of sugar**, 3/4 teaspoon of each **baking soda** and **salt**. Whisk the dry ingredients to combine. In a separate bowl, beat **2 eggs**. Add 2/3 cup **coconut oil** and **2 1/2 cups of butter milk** to the eggs and add to the dry ingredients. Mix until blended. Scoop batter onto waffle iron and cook until golden brown.

Next, combine 1 cup of **heavy cream**, 2 tablespoons of **powdered sugar** and 1 tablespoon of **vanilla extract** in a bowl. Blend with an immersion blender for 2-3 minutes.

Place your waffle on a plate and top with fresh whipped cream, **diced fresh pineapple** and **shredded coconut**. Sift 1 tablespoon of **powdered sugar** on top of waffles and enjoy!





Strawberry Mousse

Bring 8 ounces of cream cheese to room temperature. Remove the stems of 5 medium strawberries, mash and blend until pureed. Add cream cheese, 4 ounces of yogurt and I cup of powdered sugar to your mashed berries. Blend until smooth. Pour into serving dishes and refrigerate. Once refrigerated the mousse will be thickened and ready to eat.





Cheesecake Filled Strawberries

Remove the stems from 3 dozen large strawberries. Cut a deep "X" in the tip of each berry. Gently spread the berries open. In a small bowl, beat 11 ounces of cream cheese, 1/2 cup of confectioner's sugar, and 1/4 teaspoon of vanilla extract until light and fluffy. Pipe or spoon 2 teaspoons into each berry. Sprinkle each berry with grated chocolate.


Club Notes \$
