Livestock Workshops and Skillathon

Montgomery County 4-H will be offering a series of weekly Thursday night Livestock Workshops. These workshops will also serve as Livestock Skillathon practices. Practices will start on January 2 and end on March 6. Each week will be focused on a different category of Skillathon, from Meats identification, to wool judging, to equipment, and feed identifications. Youth can attend for just one or two nights, or every week. Participants are encouraged to compete in the State contest on Saturday, March 1, 2025. A 4-H Record Book is a standard record of your activities in 4-H - your projects, activities, events, skills development and learning experiences. The 4-H Record Book helps improve your skills in record keeping, goal management, and reflection on your achievements and growth in 4-H.

- 1. Place a rubber band around the Record Book so the book stays together.
- 2. If you are submitting your Record Book personally, or if a Club Leader is submitting Record Books, please contact a 4-H Staff to be available to receive the Record Book(s.)

Terp Young Scholars

Applications will open January 7 for the Terp Young Scholars. The Terp Young Scholars will take place in College Park from July 14 to August 1, 2025.

The program provide the participants the experience of learning how to navigate the college experience with the University of Maryland's Terp Young Scholars. The participants have the opportunity to take college courses in person or online. The students select one three-credit course (offered either in-person or 100% online). Classes are held weekdays, Monday - Friday, with meeting times varying according to the specific course.

Domestic Applicant Eligibility

- Applicants must be a rising high school sophomore, junior, senior, or graduating senior; and
- Applicants must have an unweighted academic average of 3.0 or better.

- If there are extenuating circumstances that have negatively influenced an applicant's GPA, submit a GPA Exception Appeal prior to submitting the Terp Young Scholars application.
- Submit Exception Appeal: Complete the <u>GPA Exception Appeal</u> form. The form requires an upload of your high school transcript, a letter of support from a high school teacher/administrator and a statement attesting to how you plan to succeed in the program.

Select Commuter or Online Option

Applicants who select a course offered through in-person instruction must participate via the <u>Commuter Option</u>. Terp Young Scholars does not offer a residential option.

• Applicants who select a course offered through 100% online instruction must participate via the <u>Online Option</u>.

Applications open January 7, 2025 and close June 1, 2025

Changes to Division 15 Eggs and Honey

Division 15 name has been changed to "Agricultural Products". In addition to the Division's name change, new classes were added. The new Division is as follows:

RULES

- 1. All exhibitors must comply with Building Rules and Regulations.
- If quality warrants, five premiums will be awarded.
- 3. Exhibitor should have age appropriate knowledge of varieties, maturities, and harvest dates as applicable. The exhibitor must have raised, helped raise, and/or harvested the products exhibited.
- 4. Exhibits of hay and straw must be one flake and securely tied two ways. If the exhibit is taken from a round or large square bale, the exhibit must be compressed and securely tied four ways. Maximum size is 18"W x18"D x 6"H
- 5. Any exhibits containing mold will be removed before display.

- 6. For classes 9-25, a 3x5 index card must be attached to exhibit with tape or string. The following information should be included on the card.
- a) Crop Variety
- b) Intended use
- c) Date of seeding
- d) Harvest date
- e) Date ensiled (if applicable)

- 1. Eggs, brown (one dozen)
- 2. Eggs, white (one dozen)
- 3. Eggs, other (one dozen)
- 4. Honey, dark comb (one pound)
- 5. Honey, light comb (one pound)
- 6. Honey, dark extracted (one pound)
- 7. Honey, light extracted(one pound)
- 8. Honey, Educational Exhibit, size: 24"W x 12"D x 36"H
- 9. Baled hay, single legume variety, field cured.
- 10. Baled hay, single variety- timothy, field cured.
- 11. Baled hay, single variety- orchard grass, field cured.
- 12. Baled hay, mix, field cured.
- 13. Baled straw, any variety, field cured.
- 14. Haylage, any variety, one quart jar with lid, ensiled at least 7 weeks.
- 15. Silage, any variety, one quart jar with lid, ensiled at least 4 weeks.
- 16. Corn, five stalks, green with ear attached, this year's crop only.
- 17. Corn, Sweet, five ears with closed husk, this year's crop only.
- 18. Corn, Indian or Popcorn variety, five ears, current or previous year's crop acceptable.
- 19. Corn, any other variety, five ears, current or previous year's crop acceptable.
- 20. Corn, shelled, one quart jar with lid, current or previous year's crop acceptable.
- 21. Soybeans, black or yellow variety, one quart jar with lid, current or previous year's crop acceptable.
- 22. Sorghum, one quart jar with lid, current or previous year's crop acceptable.
- 23. Wheat, one quart jar with lid, this year's crop only.
- 24. Barley, one quart jar with lid, this year's crop only.
- 25. Rye, one quart jar with lid, this year's crop only.
- 26. Other farm product.

From the Editor

Winter started on December 21, and will end on March 20. Yet, seed catalogs began appearing in my mailbox before the holidays! I already received several catalogs, and I started my list of what I want to plant. My favorite catalogs are the ones with glossy pages and pretty pictures.

Choosing vegetables or flowers to enter at the fair will require some planning. If you are seasoned gardener, you may choose plants that will be ready at fair time. If on the other hand, you are a beginner gardener, you will find a lot of useful information in the catalogs. You will learn how many days it will take to harvest, whether seeds are best started indoors or outdoors, if they prefer full sun, partial shade, wet, or dry soil. You will also have to make the decision on what sort of seeds you want, organic, heirloom, or hybrid, and how much the seeds cost.

Whether you are a seasoned gardener or a beginner, talk with other gardeners or compare notes with other 4-H'ers on what vegetables and flowers did well this past summer.

Remember to plant enough of each vegetable and flower so you can select the best specimens to enter at the fair.

In addition, when it is finally time to register for the fair, register all of the vegetables and flowers you anticipate being ready at fair time. Although preentries are required by the end of registration, pre-entry will not be a requirement, but is still encouraged, for Divisions 13: Vegetables, Division 14: Flower Specimens, and Division 15: Agricultural Products only.


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
