Reflectons of 2024





For nature, winter is a time to slow down a bit. It is a little bit the same for 4-H. In the winter, 4-H has fewer events. But we still stay busy but in a different way. Just like our members are working on record books and reflecting on how to improve their projects the following year, we at the 4-H office are utilizing our time to reflect on the year and make plans for the next busy 4-H season how to continually make the best better for all our 4-H events and activities.

As I reflected on 2024, I started thinking we missed an anniversary of some sort.... What was it? The anniversary of the 4-H clover emblem! The 4-H clover emblem was patented in 1924 - 100 years ago! At the end of the 14-year patent term in 1939, Congress passed a law to protect the use of the 4-H name and emblem.

Like many things in 4-H, the Clover Emblem has an interesting history. In 1907, the first emblem was designed by O.H. Benson, who was superintendent of Wright County, Iowa schools, along with Jessie Field Shambaugh, from Page County, Iowa. But the neat part is that the first clover logo was a 3-leaf clover with the "H's" standing for Head, Heart, and Hands. A four-leaf clover design with H's appeared informally around 1908. In 1911, Benson referred to the need for four H's -- suggesting that they stand for "Head, Heart, Hands, and Hustle... head trained to think, plan and reason; heart trained to be true, kind and sympathetic; hands trained to be useful, helpful and skillful; and the hustle to render ready service, to develop health and vitality..." In 1911, at a meeting of club leaders in Washington, DC, they approved the present 4-H design. O.B. Martin is credited with suggesting that the H's signify Head, Heart, Hands, and Health - universally used since then.

Without a doubt, 4-H has a neat history. Just as we have seen 4-H evolve over the years, we will continue to evolve and grow. In 2025, we look forward to growing 4-H even more!

Join us this year for the Garrett County 4-H Public Speaking Contest, held on Monday, March 17th, 2025, from 5 pm-7 pm at the 4-H Extension Office. The Public Speaking Categories include Demonstration, Visual Presentation, Prepared, Extemporaneous, Interpretation, and Radio Spots. Please only select two categories. County winners for each category will be invited to participate in the Maryland State Public Speaking Contest scheduled to be held on April 26th at the University of Maryland-College Park, Plant Sciences Building. Ages: (as of Jan. 1st) ~ Junior: 8 to 10 ~ Intermediate: 11 to 13 ~ Senior: 14 to 18

General Notes: Judges may ask questions of contestants in the prepared and extemporaneous categories related to the speech's topic. Due to time constraints, questioning should be limited to two or three minutes per speaker. Questions will not be asked in the radio spot category.

PREPARED SPEECH



A Prepared Speech is a speech on any topic chosen by the 4-H member. Choose a topic that interests you; consider things like 4-H projects, hobbies, passions, school, community service, etc. Topics that might be considered controversial should be approved by the county 4-H staff in advance. 4-Hers should write, prepare, and practice their speech well in advance. Note cards containing a key word outline are permitted. Only juniors may use a complete script. Memorization is not encouraged.

 Time Limits – Juniors: 3-5 minutes: Intermediates & Seniors: 4-6 minutes

EXTEMPORANEOUS SPEECH

An Extemporaneous Speech is one that is done on the spot. The 4-H member will draw three different topics from those provided and will decide on one topic to speak on.



Juniors & Intermediates will have 30 minutes to prepare their notes and presentation. Seniors will have 15 minutes to prepare their notes and presentation. Contestants may use one side of up to four, or both sides of up to two, 5 x 8 inch note cards for their key word outline. Extemporaneous speakers will be shown colored time cards at correctly timed intervals indicating "30 SECONDS". "1 MINUTE" AND "STOP

 Time Limits – Juniors & Intermediates: 2-3 minutes; Seniors: 3-5 minutes

INTERPRETATION

An Interpretation is a memorized oral presentation of selected narrative from published works. Unpublished works are not permitted. Interpretation has three subcategories which include dramatic, humorous, and poetry. For interpretation, contestants may choose to wear a costume and opt to sit for the presentation. Examples of source material include books, scripts, monologues, plays, etc. The contestant must provide at least one typed/photo copy of the presentation to judges.

• Time Limits – Juniors: 1½-3 minutes; Intermediates: 2-4 minutes; Seniors; 3-5 minutes



VISUAL PRESENTATION

A Visual Presentation is a presentation using props (such as charts, PowerPoint slides, posters, animals, etc.) that help illustrate and accentuate the presentation. The props allow the audience to see



and understand facts and concepts shared in the speech. Contestants should construct a speech like they doing a prepared speech, and include pauses/breaks to point to a prop, hold up a poster, show slides, etc. These pauses should be factored into the overall time of the presentation. Contestant must provide all necessary props/equipment.

Time Limits - Juniors: 3-5 minutes; Intermediates & Seniors: 4-6 minutes

DEMONSTRATION

Step 1 Step 2 Step 3 Step 4

A Demonstration is a presentation where the contestant shows step by step how to do or make something. Some examples include: how to groom a rabbit for show, how to make a corsage, how to make balloon animals, etc. The contestant would prepare and bring all the supplies needed for their "howto" demonstration. Supplemental materials such as posters with instructions, take-home directions, and samples for taste testing, etc. are encouraged.



Time Limits - Juniors, Intermediates & Seniors: 3-15 minutes



RADIO SPOT

A Radio Spot is an exactly 30 second "public address" or "public service announcement" you would hear on the radio. Radio spots may include a musical or sound effect introduction and/or background, but may not include a spoken introduction or "tag" by anyone other than the contestant. If music or a sound effect is used, the contestant must provide and

operate the sound-making device. The contestant must provide a complete

written script (including notations about music/sound effects) to the timekeeper to aid in timing accuracy. Musical/sound effect introductions and endings are considered a part of the radio spot and must not cause the 30
